

Background


- First sighting was in December 2008

- Draft Response Plan Process initiated





Equipment prizes will be awarded to those who bring in the most lionfish during each month. The table below lists sample prizes that will be available for each category.

To enter your catch in the Monthly Lionfish Tournaments, captured lionfish must be dropped off at one of the Collection Points located throughout Belize and are outlined in the table below. Each entry must include person's name, location of capture, and date of capture. The Collection Point facility will issue you a receipt for the number of fish delivered. If you would like to keep

Collection Point, the tail fin will be cut off for use in DNA analysis.

Grand Prize winners, those who have turned in the most lionfish from May to Nov. will be announced on Dec 15, 2010. Please contact the nearest Collection Point for more details, the Lionfish Project Coordinator, or visit our website for undates and complete rules

"My meat tastes nice, but DON'T touch my fins!"

Please remember that Lionfish have 13 venomous spines on their dorsal (top) fin and 5 venomous spines on the ventral and anal (bottom) fins. If these spines puncture your skin you will experience severe pain, therefor all are urged to safely capture and

handle lionfish. They are reported to taste good, but care must be taken when filleting. At the 12 Lionfish Outreach Workshops that will be held in coastal

communities throughout Belize we will present more details on the invasive lionfish and provide opportunities to learn how to safely handle clean and cook lionfish. Please look for more details coming soon on when the Lionfish Outreach Training Workshop will be coming to you



Challenges

- Extraction from no take areas
- Extraction from deep waters
- Non protected areas has no management presence
- Fishers killings not reported gap in data
- Slow season on tourism and fishing creates limited presence at sea
- More awareness and trainings needed on handling and use of the fish
- Financial needs for plan implementation in 2010

Way Forward

- ECOMAR funded by Community Protected Areas Management (COMPACT) 2010
- Over 80 samples sent to USGS for DNA analysis awaiting results
- Finalising Consultation process for the elaboration of the response plan
- At this time ECOMAR has over 1000 samples in storage
- Foreign Universities assistance in DNA analysis
- Implementation of Plan September 2010
