A. Summary of IYOR 2008 Activities:

Please tell us, briefly, about your activities for IYOR.

SPREP, through the CRISP, is coordinating the Pacific Year Of the Reef (PYOR). Funds have been given to countries to fund activities as part of PYOR. Lots of countries have used these fundings to organize the environment week on the theme of coral reefs. Two regional school competitions have been launched, legends of the reefs and challengecoralreef. As part of challengecoralreef, 11 schools throughout the regions have been awarded with funding to implement actions to save their local reefs.

SPREP is editing a quarterly e-newsletter on PYOR and CRISP projects and a website has also been developed for PYOR (www.sprep.org/pyor).

A side-event on PYOR will be organized at the SPREP meeting in September in Pohnpei to reach the level of decision-makers and raise awareness on the themes of economic value of reefs and good governance.

B. Emerging Issues

Please identify any emerging issues that you feel should be taken up by ICRI.

I think data sharing is a critical issue, at least in the Pacific region, as fisheries, environment, forestry, agriculture and land departments usually do not work together. It is very often that Fisheries and Environment departments are in competition for coral reef management. In some cases, environment deals with coral monitoring and Fisheries, with fish monitoring...When we talk about integrated coastal management, data sharing to allow integrated decision making seems to be a key.
