Answer: We have read the report and the results guide our work as we support national governments in their reporting requirements for MEA's, as well as guiding the outcomes of coastal zone and marine spatial plans.

- (ICRI) The GCRMN intends to establish time-bound task forces to address specific priority issues and to build capability and capacity across the network. As a first priority, a Data Task Force was established. The Task Force brings together subject matter experts to increase the transparency, reproducibility, and robustness of future GCRMN reports alongside capacity in monitoring, data collection, analysis, management and sharing of coral reefs and associated ecosystems. The Task Force will focus on:
 - Improving data integration and analyses to facilitate the production of GCRMN regional and global reports; and
 - Promoting good data management practices based on FAIR data principles for the coral reef scientific community.

At UNEP-WCMC, we manage the ICCA Registry, which is a database where custodian communities themselves provide data, case studies, maps, photos and stories, providing a muchneeded evidence base to promote the recognition and support of ICCAs worldwide. The registry is part of The ICCA Global Support Initiative (ICCA-GSI), implemented by UNDP GEF Small Grants Programme and partners.

The ICCA Registry is linked to the Protected Planet Initiative. This initiative provides the authoritative platform for global data on protected and conserved areas, tracks progress towards the implementation of area-based conservation targets and provides support for the achievement of these targets. As part of the Protected Planet Initiative, we're working to increase the recognition of protected and conserved areas governed by Indigenous Peoples and local communities, by actively supporting them to self-report data to the databases. Submitting data to these databases can provide increased global visibility of the contribution of Indigenous Peoples and local communities to biodiversity conservation.
